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# Dietetic Practice Education Update

Sharing developments and best practice with those involved in Scottish dietetic education

A shorter newsletter for you to read this time round due to several changes within the HEI's which you will hear more about. Read on to also hear about student progression, placement demand forecasting and practice education dates.

# **Student progression**

The universities now collect data on student progression through practice placements. Data below relates to the 2018 placement cycle

### Placement A

For placement A in the 2018 cycle, 68 students proceeded to and completed the placement.

## Placement B

Of the 72 students who were allocated a B placement one student decided to transfer to an alternative programme prior to the start of her placement and all other students successfully passes their 12 week placement.

## Placement C

Of the 73 students who proceeded to placement C, five students failed to successfully meet the learning within the 12 weeks allocation and will require extended weeks. These additional weeks will be allocated within the 2019 cycle.

# HEI's news roundup

#### **GCU**

As you may be aware the Postgraduate Diploma in Dietetics programme at GCU has been withdrawn, with the final cohort of PG students due to graduate this year. GCU continues to offer the undergraduate BSc (hons) Human Nutrition and Dietetics programme. GCU will still recruit a total of 25 students (+/-10%) to level one of the programme rather than split numbers across the two programmes.

There have also been some staff changes with Drs Pamela Smith and Jennie Jackson both retiring from GCU (Pam in December 2017 and Jennie in July 2018). We welcome Marian Cunningham who has moved from 0.4 to 0.9WTE. She is currently joint Undergraduate Programme Lead with Emma Kinrade and will take over Emma's role in the Operational Group. We very much welcome Marian to our group and look forward to working with her.

#### **QMU**

As part of the 5 year revalidation process at QMU the dietetic programmes were revalidated by QMU and the revised programmes were approved by the HCPC and BDA subject to completion of minor conditions. QMU will continue to deliver an UG and a PG programme. The UG programme has been revalidated as a 4 year UG masters programme (Master of Dietetics, MDiet) and the pre-registration programme will continue as a 2 year PG programme. Admission numbers to the programmes remain consistent with current intakes i.e. 12 - 15 on the UG programme and 10 - 12 on the PG programme.

There have been some staffing changes at QMU with Dr. Sara Smith taking on the role of Deputy Head of Division which has resulted in the appointment of Alison Lyles to support the dietetic teaching. We are delighted to welcome Alison to the QMU teaching team as she is an experienced RD who continues to have an honorary contract with NHS Lothian.

#### **RGU**

Many of you will have heard that Susan Lennie has moved to pastures new taking up an exciting new opportunity in Newcastle University to develop a dietetic programme. We all wish Susan well in her new position and thank her for the contribution she made at RGU and within the cluster. With Susan's departure, there have been some staffing changes. Heather will be the course leader for Masters of Dietetics (MDiet) and BSc (Hons) Nutrition and Dietetics and we have Julia Clark joining the team fulltime in July 2019. Julia has a vast amount of experience as a clinical dietitian as well as having a research portfolio having had research positions at the Rowett and Aberdeen University.

You will also be aware that RGU was validated in 2018 to run a Masters of Dietetics (MDiet) which is an undergraduate integrated masters programme. Our annual student intake remains the same (25 undergraduate places (+/- 10%) and the first intake was in September 2018. The BSc (Hons) Nutrition and Dietetics ceased taking new applicants in September 2018 and will run out with the current student cohorts finishing June 2021. Practice Placement supply requests, have been sent to Lead Practice Educators with a request that supply offers be returned to Pamela Knox, Scottish Dietetic Placement Administrator, by the 9th of August 2019.

Please note that for 2019, Health Boards have again been given a steer on the number and type of placements required and the timing that placements are required. It is hoped that by doing this, fewer requests will be made to Health Boards to change the timing of the offers made.

Lead Practice Educators will be informed of all 2020 allocations by the beginning of November 2019 at the latest.
